

Tips for Maximizing Jet Travel for Executive Teams

Tip 1: Start With Cabin Layout, Not Seat Count

Seat count is a baseline. What matters is how your team needs to function in flight. If you have a group that will work, meet, or take calls, cabin layout matters more than fitting everyone into the listed capacity. A jet that technically seats 12 can still feel tight if you need space to move or maintain privacy.



Tip 2: Consider All Time Requirements

Large cabin charter decisions improve when you treat the trip as an end-to-end block, not just airborne time. Flight duration matters, but so does the time spent on ground transportation after landing and whether your schedule can absorb a delay. Longer flights amplify small issues. A cabin that feels fine for two hours can feel limiting after five.



Tip 3: Decide How Important Nonstop Range Really Is

Nonstop range is often misunderstood in charter selection, with the tendency to either overbuy or underbuy range. A key question to consider is: What does a stop actually cost you? For some teams, a fuel stop is manageable if it protects the budget, while for others, it disrupts timing and adds uncertainty.



Tip 4: Understand Crew Requirements and Duty-Time Limits

Crew duty limits, rest requirements, and time-zone transitions influence what is possible in a single day. Be sure to take these into account when you're trying to stack multiple legs or run a tight meeting schedule. Ask your charter concierge to clarify how the trip will be staffed and what happens if your meetings run long. Having that knowledge upfront can turn a potential headache into a seamless itinerary.



Tip 5: Plan for International Routing Details Early

International private jet travel adds a layer of logistical planning beyond the flight itself. Choosing the right arrival airport, coordinating customs clearance, and building realistic timing buffers all influence how smoothly the trip runs, especially when multiple time zones or connections are involved.
